



PFLAG/HATCH 2004 College Scholarship Program

PFLAG Houston and H.A.T.C.H. (Houston Area Teen Coalition of Homosexuals) have jointly created the PFLAG/HATCH Youth Scholarship Foundation which offers a scholarship program to assist worthy youth in pursuing a college education. The scholarship program is for lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender students who have demonstrated outstanding achievement while in high school or college.

The program was originated in 1994 by PFLAG Houston which was able to grant one 4-year scholarship with a total value of \$4,000. The number and total value of the grants have increased each year. In 1998, H.A.T.C.H. combined their new program with PFLAG's ongoing effort and the PFLAG/HATCH Youth Scholarship Foundation (a separate 501(c)3 non-profit organization) was formed.

In July, 2003, a total of \$119,000 was awarded in college scholar-ships to Houston-area students. The 2003 scholarships ranged in amount from \$10,000 over four years to \$2,000 over two years.

PFLAG National Scholarships provide an important, positive statement to a group of young people that is often marginalized, and subjected to harassment and discrimination. Links to the application materials are at the bottom of this page. Please be sure to also read the general information and letter to school administrators.

This is the second year of the PFLAG National Scholarships Program, and this year we offer two levels of scholarships at \$2,500 and \$1,000.

In order to be eligible for these funds, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Be a graduating high school senior entering higher education for the first time in fall 2005 (if student graduated in 2004 and took a year off before going to college they are also eligible to apply).
- Self identify as either a gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender person, or as a supporter of gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender people
- Demonstrate an interest in service to the LGBT community
- Have applied to an accredited higher education institution in pursuit of either an associate's degree leading to transfer credits towards a bachelor's degree, or a bachelor's degree program at a four-year college

"On behalf of Nancy McDonald, chair of the Scholarship Advisory Committee (SAC), and the thirteen SAC members, I am pleased to present to you the first PFLAG National Scholars. There are 25 PFLAG National Scholars; most are featured below and several others opted to avoid publicity around their awards. These stu-dents were chosen from the 255 scholarship applications that we received. Please join with us in congratulating them. The 2004 PFLAG National Scholarships Program was made possible by several generous donations. The Palmer B. Carson Trust, which established the scholarships program with a substan-tial bequest from Mr. Carson's estate, provided the funding for 19 of this year's scholarships. We received additional funding for another four scholarships from the Dow Chemical Company employee group Gays, Lesbians and Allies at Dow (GLAD); two scholarships were funded by Mr. John Drakulich. We used a bi-level selection process. The initial cut was made by the members of the SAC and two representatives from GLAD. The finalists were then reviewed by eight college professors. We are grateful to each of the SAC members and the college profes-sors for their time and expertise.

Hometown: Shrewsbury, MA College: Boston University




Kalie Dolph

ANTI-GAY HATE VIOLENCE MUST BE ADDRESSED LO-CALLY AND NATIONALLY THROUGH STRONG LEGISLA-TION, RIGOROUS LAW ENFORCEMENT, AND WIDESPREAD COMMUNITY EDUCATION.

According to the Federal Bureau of Investigation Hate Crimes Statistics report, released in 2001, there were 1,317 reported anti-gay hate crimes in 1999. Of the 7,876 bias-motivated crimes, sexual orientation is ranked third in number of reported hate crimes, with race ranked first, followed by religion. Reported anti-gay violence has been increasing since 1996.

What about the First Amendment?

Hate Crime laws do not punish protected speech. They do include bias motivated incidents involving force or threat of violence. Hate Crimes Prevention legislation applies to cases involving death or bodily injury, which are clearly violent crimes and not protected by the first amendment to the constitution.

Why a law for gay people, what about straight people?

The inclusion of sexual orientation in Hate Crimes legislation applies to all sexual orientations. Therefore, a case where someone is injured or killed because of their heterosexuality is also covered under Hate Crimes legislation. The protection provided is equal.

Why involve the federal government?

Sometimes there are reasons that a local jurisdiction needs assistance from the federal government. Hate Crimes legislation allows for monetary and personnel resources to be provided to a local jurisdiction when they are unable, or unwilling, to investigate or prosecute the crime. Without Hate Crimes legislation these resources would not be available. The US Attorney General, or her representative, would have to evaluate the case through a stringent certification process before there would be federal involvement.

What about protecting people with religious beliefs?

Existing hate crimes legislation currently includes religion. Improved Hate Crimes legislation would expand the protections for religion by removing overly-restrictive obstacles to federal involvement.
